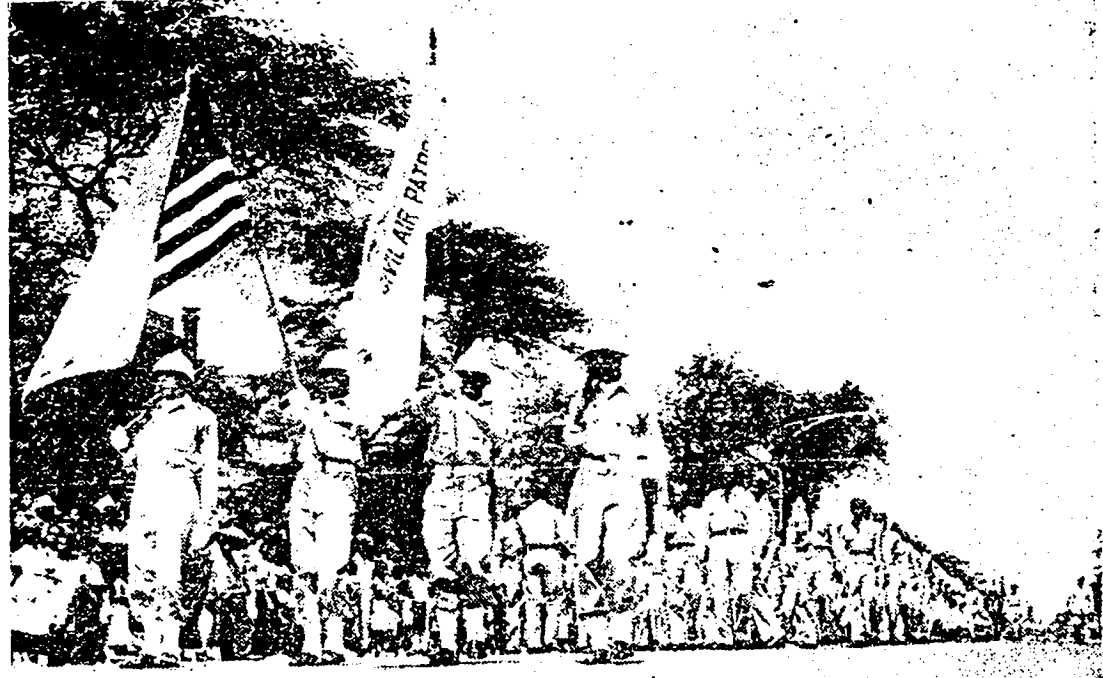


Billiken Parade Highlights



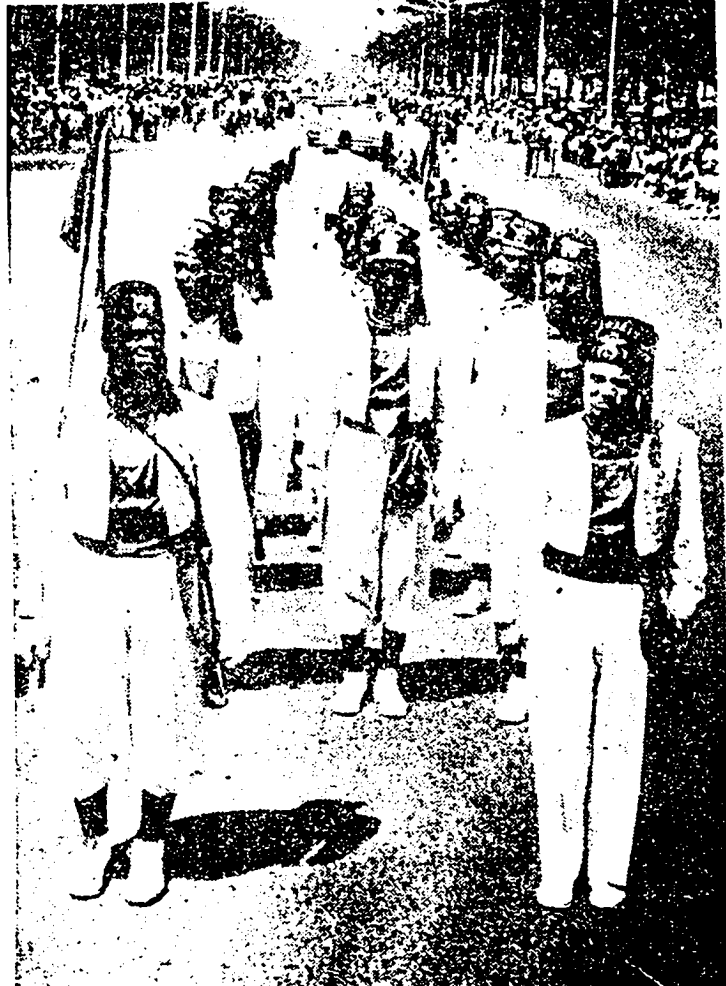

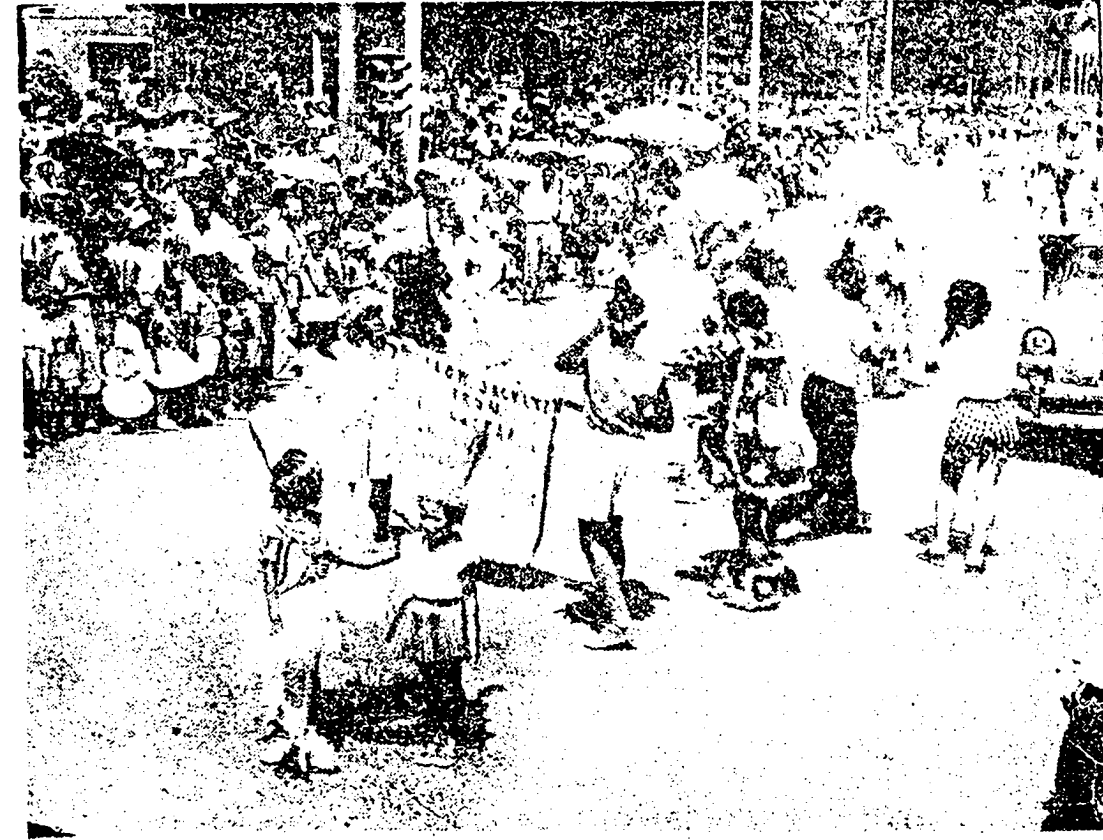
SMARTLY STEPPING Civil Air Patrol unit drew cheers from thousands as it paraded along South Park with banners and flags snapping in the breeze.



STATEWAY PARK Friendly Indians and Chicago Park District combine to offer an eye-catching display in the colorful parade. The authentically attired Indians are in background.



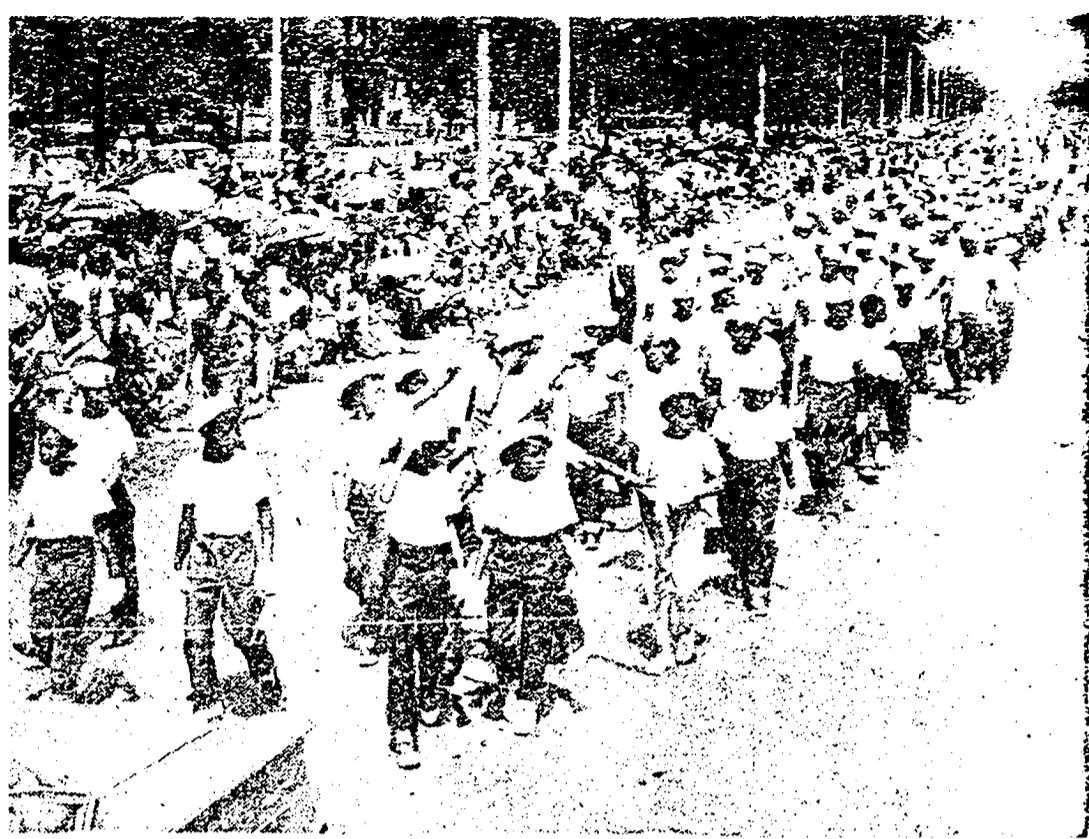
RESPLENDENT in richly colored uniforms was the marching unit from Arabic Temple 44, Noble Order of the Mystic Shrine.

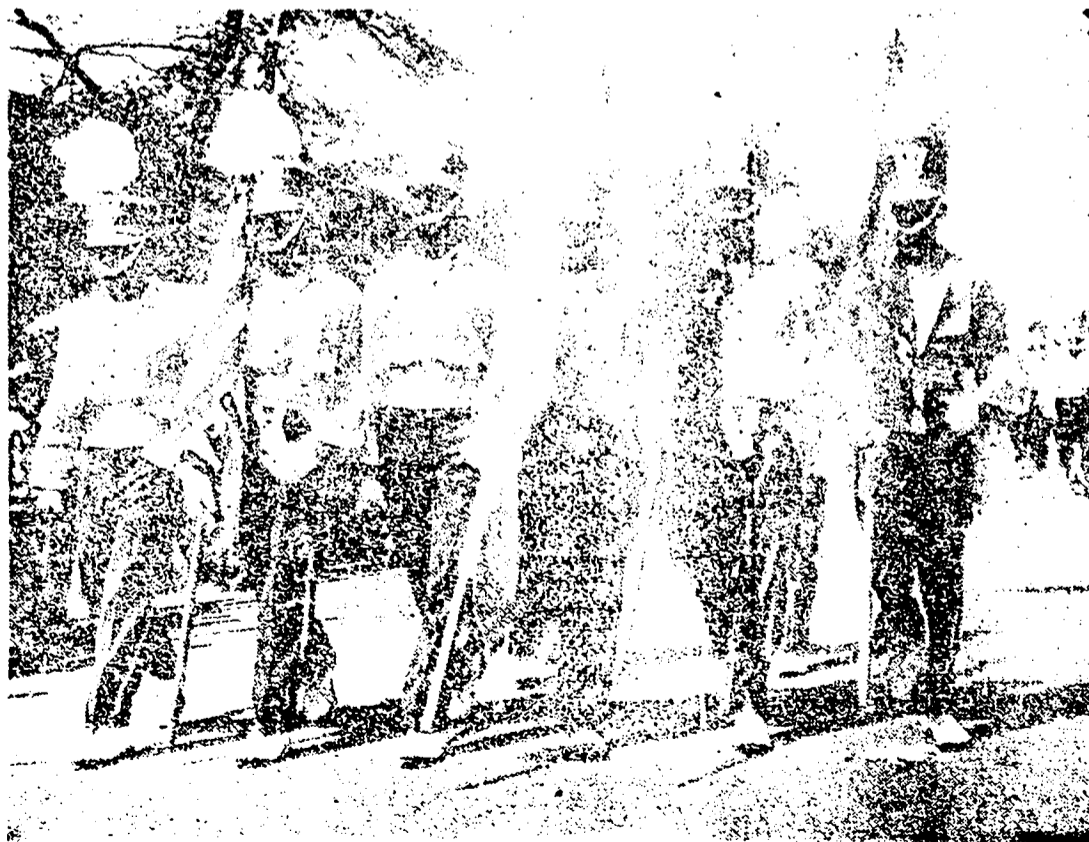
GIRLS AND BOYS of the 5th District Juvenile Club prance along South Parkway in T-shirts and caps. They were just one of scores of youth groups participating.
