

1,000 Lawyers To Attend 33rd National Convention

More than a thousand lawyers are expected to attend the 33rd annual convention of the National Bar Association which will convene Aug. 28-30 at Chicago's hotel Sherman according to James A. McLendon, president of Cook

County Bar association, host to the convention.

Three outstanding events which will be of interest to the general public will present the Honorable Wade H. McCree, recently appointed judge of the Third Judi-

cial Circuit of Michigan as principal speaker at a luncheon which will be held at 12:30 p.m., August 28 at the Hotel Sherman, and at 8 p.m.

Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People will address a public meeting at the Dunbar Vocational High school.

On August 29 at 7:30 p.m., Edward Bennett Williams, of Washington, D. C., noted trial lawyer and Professor of Criminal Law at Georgetown university, will be the principal speaker at the Annual Awards banquet which will be held in the Bal Taborin Room of the Hotel Sherman.

According to Charles F. Lane, Convention Chairman, other highlights of the Convention will consist of a Panel on Criminal Law, with discussions by Dean A. A. Lenoir, of Southern university Law school on "Use of Extraordinary Legal Remedies in Criminal Proceedings," and Curtis Mitchell, of Washington, D. C., on the use of Evidence obtained by illegal search and seizure, wire tapping, use of confessions and how to exclude same from the trial," with Euclid L. Taylor, serving as moderator.

A seminar on negligence, will present Melvin M. Belli, internationally known attorney and authority on trial and court trends. Paul Cantor of Georgetown university Law school, Washington, D. C., who holds both medical and law degrees, Charles W. Anderson, jr., of Louisville, Ky. and Leo S. Karlin of Chicago.

A panel on civil rights will include James N. Nabrit of Howard university Law school, Washington, D. C., Raymond Pace Alexander, City Councilman, Philadelphia, Thomas M. Jenkins, College of Lal. Florida A&M university, Loren Miller, of Los Angeles, Calif., and the Hon. Gordon M. Tiffany, Director of the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights.
