

**JOHN JONES.****THE FUNERAL SERVICES.**

Ex-County Commissioner John Jones was buried yesterday afternoon from his late residence, No. 43 Ray avenue. THE CHICAGO TRIBUNE of Thursday contained a lengthy account of this eminent colored citizen's career, the good he has done the race both by example and precept, and the manner of his death: therefore, further remark on this score is needless. The esteem in which he was held, not only by the colored people of this city, but by the white folks, was well shown yesterday when at the funeral services, in the house and outside, not less than 700 people gathered, including military and civic bodies. The little street was lined on either side, and among the carriages were many private equipages.

**THE MOURNERS**

Included Ex-Legislative Representative Thomas J. K. C. Forrest, Col. Cleary, Col. Mike Hickey, the Rev. D. E. Baptist, of the Colored Baptist Church, the Rev. Mr. Booth, of Qulu's Chapel, Lloyd J. Wheeler and wife, C. A. Morse, the Rev. Mr. Johnson, Capt. Hines, South Side, Arsenu Gray, Richard Phelps, Jacob Platt and family, E. P. Smith, Joseph Duncan, F. W. Carpenter, Willis Montgomery, Ald. Among the relatives were his wife and daughters and brothers-in-law Henry Bradford, Cyrus Richardson, H. D. Kline, and Alfred Richardson. The pall-bearers comprised Messrs. Robert Warren, R. M. Hancock, J. H. Hadlin, John Winslow, George Smith, and Elijah Cleary.

The floral tributes were abundant and very beautiful, among them being a large cross of roses, lilies, and smilax, given by the Star Lodge.

**THE SERVICES**

were conducted by Elder Raymond, of the old Tabernacle, now the Second Baptist Church. He took occasion to briefly comment upon the life of the deceased, dwelling upon the good he had done during his career, and lamenting the irreparable loss to his friends.

Soon after 2 o'clock the body was taken to Graceland, where it was interred. Heading the procession was the drum corps of the Sixteenth Battalion. Then came Maj. Nevins' military band, followed by the John Jones Lodge, and the North Star Lodge A. F. and A. M., the Corinthian Commandery, No. 18, K. T., the Summer Guards from St. Louis, and a large number of the Brothers of Union.
