
OBITUARY.

ALFRED H. RICHARDSON, Chicago, died at his residence, 830 West Sixtieth street, on Tuesday, aged 93. He was the first person of his race to make his home here. He was born in Somerville, Tenn., and early in life came North. For several years he was one of the agents of the "underground railroad" in Alton, Ill. He removed to Chicago in 1837. He was a brother-in-law of John Jones, the first colored County Commissioner of Cook County. He left three sons and two daughters. The funeral services will be held at his late residence tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock. Burial will be at Oakwoods.

HENRY J. HAMILTON of Springfield, Ill., a veteran railroad man of the West, died yesterday, aged 60 years. He was born in New York and at the age of 30 came to Chicago, where he rose to the supervision of the American car works. About 1886 he left the employ of the Wabash, which he had served for many years, and became foreman of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad shops at Moberly, Mo. In 1891 he retired on account of ill-health. His son is Captain Frank H. Hamilton, commander of the Engineer Corps, Illinois National Guard.

SAMUEL C. PAINE, Western Springs, Ill., died at the residence of his sister, Mrs. M. P. Crumbaugh, yesterday. He was born in Cincinnati, O., seventy-three years ago. In his later years he became the owner of a cotton warehouse in Memphis, where he lived for a number of years. In 1897 he moved to Western Springs. The funeral will be held today at 10 o'clock.

MRS. HULDA WEED PENNOYER of Kenosha, Wis., widow of the late Dr. Edgar Pennoyer, died at the sanitarium founded by her husband yesterday. She was 79 years old and had lived in Kenosha a half century. She was prominent in charity. Three children survive her.
