Up to a late hour last night nothing definite had been determined by the party leaders regarding nominations for Assessors in either the South or West Town. Caucuses were held, but failed to accomplish anything. It was generally conceded that H. G. Foreman or Samuel Trude was most in favor with the South Town delegates, and E. R. Brainerd, who will go into the convention as chairman of the First Ward delegation, predicted that one of these two men would get the nomination. However, there was a good deal of talk about giving it to Perry A. Hull or R. B. De Young. Martin B. Madden said no slate had been made up.

It is thought Arthur J. Dunbar of the Sixth will be put on the ticket for Collector, Charles Pearce of the Second for Supervisor, and a First Ward man for Clerk. C. F. Adams is the only aspirant thus far mentioned. However, the Third Ward delegation is to meet this morning and try to agree upon a candidate for Assessor.

The situation in the West Town is even more complicated and unsettled than in the South Town. The convention will undoubtedly be compelled to select the nominees. Half a dozen men were talked of last night.
