

Name 8 Postal Supervisors

through Chicago last week en route to Washington to report findings of his investigations in the Memphis, New Orleans, and Jackson, Miss., post offices.

Postmaster Albert Goldman of New York was credited with giving democracy a boost this week by the National Alliance of Postal Employees, for promoting six Negro department employees to supervisory positions.

The New York appointments brought the total of Negro postal supervisors there to 65, eight of whom have been promoted in the last four months.

According to Ashby Carter, president of the NAPE, the situation is in sharp contrast to that in Chicago, where there are 19 Negro supervisors out of a total of 800. Carter said the only Negro promoted by Chicago Postmaster Ernest J. Kruetgen in the past six months was his personal valet.

It has been reported that the Chicago situation has been placed before the Senate subcommittee on Civil Service and the Post Office, which has an investigator in the field seeking information on discrimination because of race, color, creed, or political affiliation.
