

NEW HISTORY OF CIVIL WAR URGED

Confederate Leader Calls on Comrades to Write Their War Experiences

PRESENTS HIS VIEW OF OLD CONFLICT

CHARLOTTE, N. C., June 5 (AP)—General A. T. Goodwyn, commander in chief of the United Confederate Veterans, in his address today at the annual reunion of his organization called on the members of his command to write their war experiences in order to aid in correcting "the errors and falsehoods" of prevailing histories of the war between the states.

General Goodwyn read part of his address and then gave the manuscript to his wife, who finished it.

An Economic War

"An American history that would do justice to all concerned would clearly show that it was a veiled economic war of industrial greed against the agricultural south," General Goodwyn said.

"Justice cannot be done to the people of the south," he continued, "if the acts of 1861-65 are to be interpreted by the standards of today. The critic should not be preoccupied by assumptions, nor prejudiced questions and interests of a former period, nor be heretic of an apprehensive sympathy with the environments of those whose conduct and opinions are criticized."

Thank God for Position

"We fought four years of military war against almost incredible odds, in sober retrospection, in prayerful introspection, in the words of another we can say "we thank God that at Appomattox we were with General Lee and not with General Grant."

"We fought ten years of political war to save our civilization after our southland had been divided into military districts by a sectional despotism of selfishness, greed, deception and hate."

"The wisdom, endurance, courage and loyalty of a people were never more sternly tested than during those deplorable years. Selfish, designing politicians were the malefactors of that period, as they are the menacing influence to law and order today."

LOCAL NEGRO CLUB SPONSORS RECITAL

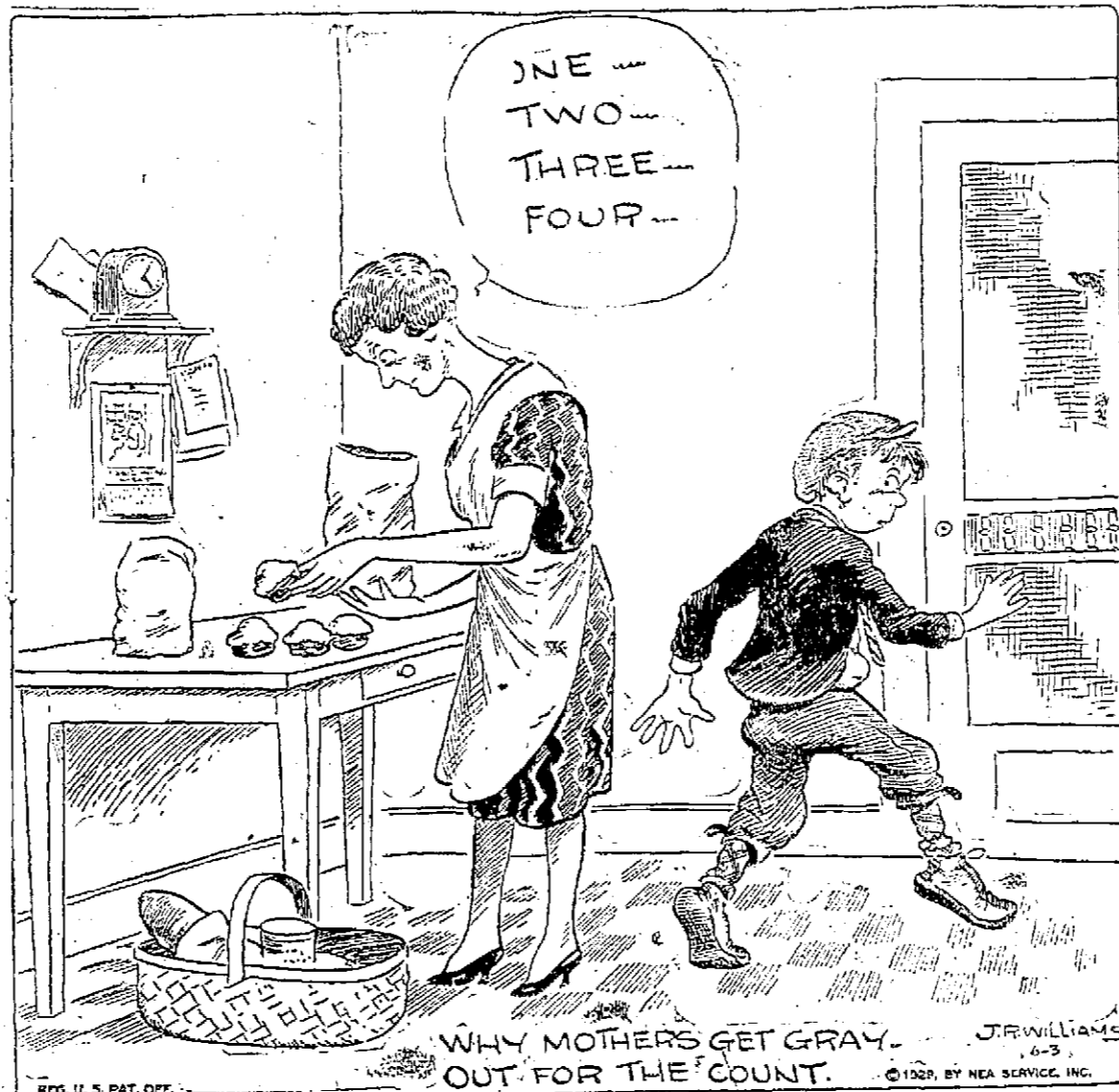

NEGRO SHRINERS WIN IN SUPREME COURT

A decision has been handed down by the Supreme Court of the United States of general interest to white members of the Shrine. It grew out of a suit started in the supreme court of the State of Texas and the litigation has been going on since 1918. The issue arose when the Houston (Tex.) Temple of the white order sought an injunction against the Houston temple of the "Ancient Egyptian Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine," the negro order, to stop the imitation of its title ceremonies. The United States Supreme Court reversed the decree of the Texas supreme court, which had upheld the white order in its attempt to debar the negro order from imitating the constitution, titles, emblems and regalia of the white order of the
