**MIDDLESEX.**

**AT** the **GENERAL QUARTER SESSION** of the Peace of our Lord the King, holden in and for the County of Middlesex, at the Sessions-House for said County, (by adjournment) on Wednesday the twenty-second Day of April, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, King of Great Britain, before William Mainwaring, Esq. the Rev. Herbert Mayo, Doctor in Divinity, Nathaniel Coucut, Thomas Gordon, David Walker, John Croft, William Beamier, Charles Triguet Esquire, and others their Fellows, Justices of our said Lord the King, assigned to keep the peace in the County aforesaid; and also to hear and determine divers Felonies, Trespasses, and other Misdemeanours committed in the same County.

WHEREAS it has been represented to this Court, that during the evening of the tenth day of March last, when the Illumination took place on the happy event of his Majesty's recovery, from his late Indisposition, the Windows were broke of several Houses in different parts of the Town, inhabited by Quakers, who from religious principles do not think it proper to demonstrate their loyalty and affection by illuminations or other outward shew, though heartily attached to his Majesty's Royal Person and Government. And whereas it appears that preparations are making for Illuminations on **THIS DAY**, the 24th Instant, it is ordered by this Court that the High Constables, petty Constables, Headboroughs, and other Peace Officers in their several Divisions, Districts and Parishes, do their utmost endeavours to suppress any Tumults or Disorders in the Streets, or other public avenues, and that they be particularly vigilant in preventing any insult being offered, or injury being done to the Persons or Property of any of his Majesty's Subjects, whose Houses shall not happen to be illuminated at that time.

**At a COMMITTEE** of the **SOCIETY** in **LONDON**, instituted for the **ABOLITION** of the **SLAVE TRADE**,  
 April 14, 1789.

**THIS COMMITTEE** apprehending that the Resolutions of the West India Planters and Merchants on the proposed Abolition of the Slave Trade, may have a tendency to excite Alarms for the Commerce and Revenue of the Nation, although no Attempt is made to support the said Resolutions by any proofs whatever, and all considerations on the Injustice and Inhumanity of the Slave Trade are disregarded,  
 Do Resolve—  
 1. That, from the diminished supply of African Slaves during the Time of the War, from the numerous Influences of Plantations in the West India Islands, which have flourished without any purchase of Slaves for many Years, from the acknowledged deficiency on the part of the Planters in protecting and promoting the increase and population of Slaves, and more particularly from a Consideration of the natural and useful progress of Population when unchecked by Oppression, there is no reason or any description of his Majesty's Subjects, to be alarmed at the proposed Abolition of the Slave Trade, under the delusive fear, that a decline in the Cultivation of the Sugar Colonies will be the consequence.  
 2. That the Trade to Africa for Slaves, inasmuch as it occasions a loss of Seaman in a proportion more than double, that of all the other Branches of Commerce from this Kingdom, is a national Injury; and inasmuch as it tends to prevent a just and honourable Traffick, with the extensive Regions of Africa is highly impolitic, and detrimental to the Navigation, Manufactures, Trade and Revenue of Great Britain.
